

Many people missed the first recycling pickup on Wednesday. August 1 even though it was sent out by Reach Alert and email. These two systems also notify residents of cancellations or changes in garbage collection. Reach Alert has united pets with their owners. Should you not have a computer, try Reach Alert. There will be a laptop computer at the Ice Cream Social for people who want to get on the City's email address list.

Recycling Update

The biweekly recycling began Wednesday, August 1. Every household was given the opportunity to receive a bin. You are not limited to this container. Should you have many more items, you may use a box or large container also. If using a garbage can, label it



recycling. You may go on line and order a larger receptacle on wheels or shop around for one. This is a three-month trial. Since the City is paying for every household, we will evaluate the usage and decide to continue. The dates for pickup September through December (if we continue it) are as follows: September 12 and 26; October 10 and 24; November 7 and 21; and December 6 and 20. Make sure you put the recycling out the night before or before 6:30 A.M. on the day of pickup.

Parking In Windy Hills



Several residents have complained because they received parking tickets for parking on the street overnight. There are signs posted throughout the city stating that parking is



Graveyard On Waterford Road

Windy Hills signs state that it is the City of Historic Homes. Among these historic homes are historic cemeteries. There are also family connections. Instead of money, land grants were given to veterans of the French and Indian War. According to the Jefferson County tax records, Frederick Edwards built the first home in our City on Westport Road in 1790. Richard Taylor began constructing his house on Waterford Road in 1792. He sold it to John George Rudy in 1795. Rudy sold it to his son-in-law John Herr in 1797. In 1825 he bought the Edward's house on Westport Road. Moving to more modern times, the widening of Westport Road began. In the summer of 2011, nine bodies were excavated in the construction. Prior to the Civil War, slaves were not usually buried in the family cemetery or with tombstones. DNA testing was done by the State, indicating the deceased lived prior to the War. As there was no more room in the Westport Road Cemetery, they were brought to the Waterford Cemetery because of the Rudy-Herr connection. Small, flat gravestones mark each of the nine buried remains. A small service was held at the interment, presided by a minister.

This information was provided by Dennis and Mary Sheridan and So Close to Home: The Legacy of Brownsboro Road by Lynn Renau. Mrs. Renau, now deceased, lived in the historic home on Waterford near the home with the cemetery.

Grass In Our Curbs/Gutters
