Dear Neighbors,

I know many of us look forward to autumn with the cooler air and beautiful colors but this fall will look a lot different in our City. It will still be a wonderful time of year but we will need to continue our social distancing. It's a **GREAT** time to enjoy our lovely Green while following the state guidelines. Please mask up and keep 6 feet apart.

Many of you have been following the LG&E tree and vegetation removal progress within our city. Although we hate to lose our magnificent trees, the company is working with the City and the homeowners to minimize the impact. The LG&E arborist is working with Councilwomen Greer and the homeowners to identify appropriate replacements for the trees that have been removed. In fact, several of the trees that were cut down were diseased and "failing" and would have had to eventually be removed at the homeowners' expense. Said homeowners were either offered compensated the trees or suitable replacements. Additionally, LG&E has graciously offered to plant small trees on the state right-of-way on the north side of Westport Road between Ambridge and Foeburn. We are working with the highway department and LG&E to come up with an appropriate plan.

It is also tax season in Windy Hills. When you receive your tax statement, you will notice that we are offering a 45% discount if you pay by October 31, 2020. Just remember that if the taxes are not paid by the deadline, you will have to pay the full tax rate. I am VERY proud that we have been able to hold the expense line on our City budget while maintaining our revenues and sustaining a high level of services.





The City would like to remind our residents about the Application for Encroachment for Driveways. When you are resurfacing (resealing excluded) your drive, even if you are not expanding the existing driveway, a permit IS required BEFORE work begins. The purpose of this ordinance is to make sure that all driveways entering Windy Hills streets conform to Metro Louisville Codes, as to maximum dimensions allowed.

Where the existing drive is being expanded, a simple drawing is required in addition to the permit, to show dimensions of the addition. In either case, once the permit is received, the existing drive will be inspected promptly, to ensure the drive measurements meet guidelines. We will not delay your drive install if the permit is received within a reasonable time before the work is performed. It is not the City's desire to invoke a penalty on any resident but when work is done without a permit, residents risk fines or substantial expense to correct driveways that are out of compliance.

Thank you for your understanding and cooperation.

Ideas to Keep Kids Busy During the Pandemic

With public schools teaching virtually and parents trying to work either inside or out of the home, times are difficult and stressful for parents. Experts agree it is important for everyone to have a routine. Scheduled bedtimes and wakeup times should be enforced on weekdays. When dealing with schoolwork, the routine should be consistent. Short breaks should be encouraged in between subjects. Lunch should be at a certain time. The children could possibly help make the lunch. A recess should be after lunch before learning reconvenes.

Are you Zoomed out? Need some new activities for kids? Here are some to try.

- 1. A walk. Children could count the number of houses, trees, etc. on their block. They could count the number of steps they take from point A to point B. Older children could map something in Windy Hills, such as their yard or The Windy Hills Green.
- 2. Go geocaching fun for the whole family! See https://www.geocaching.com
- 3. Collect items of nature (pinecones, acorns, rocks, twigs, etc.) Children could create animals with pipe cleaners, construction paper, google eyes, yarn, and paint.
- 4. Make a dish or a fairy garden.
- 5. Make a necklace or bracelet out of pasta, beads, and paper beads.
- 6. Set up a bird feeder. The child can keep count of the different kinds of birds that visit it.
- 7. Study the weather. Make a chart of daily temperature (high and low) and precipitation. Make or purchase a labeled rain gauge and place it in an unprotected area. Get a weather thermometer. Blow bubbles outside to see which the wind moves. These activities could encourage children to explore climate and weather in more detail.
- 8. Place 10 objects on a tray. Have the child study them, cover with a dish towel, and remove one of the items. See if he/she knows which it was and continue until all items are gone.
- 9. Treasure hunt inside or outside, leaving clues.
- 10. Scavenger hunt using the letters of the alphabet.

- 11. Make a fort either out of big cardboard boxes (the adult can cut out windows and doors) or out of blankets and sheets. Let the child take a nap or eat lunch in it.
- 12. Movie night with popcorn.
- 13. Plan and cook a meal together. Discuss where the ingredients first originated (other than the grocery store) and how they were transported. What type of workers helped produce the product? This could be researched and located on a map. This project promotes geography and economics.
- 14. Play charades.
- 15. Go for a family hike in one of our many Louisville area parks. Everyone needs a break and fresh air.
- 16. Learn a new language together.
- 17. Take a virtual tour to a national park, aquarium, museum, art gallery, city, etc. Have the child write a report about it.
- 18. Have the child write a song, poem, or rap about an event in history or a current event.
- 19. Play games like *Where in the World Is Carmen Sandiego*. It is even fun for adults.
- 20. If the adult is having trouble helping with homework, besides the resources offered by your school and JCPS, there are places on the internet with help. Two especially valuable are 22 Remote Learning Tips for Parents Helping at Home and Remote Learning Resources to Support Parents and Students.









Fall Gardening Tasks



- Reseed lawn and water daily until the grass grows.
- Fertilize lawn twice (October and late November or early December).
- After checking for pests, bring in houseplants once evening temperatures are consistently below 55 degrees.
- Pull up remnants of vegetable gardens and put debris in compost pile (unless suffering from wilt) or put out for yard waste collection.
- Divide perennials. Offer extras to neighbors.
- Wait until Spring to cut back perennial foliage. Butterflies may have laid eggs in it.
- Plant trees, perennials, and pansies. (pansies winter over for spring bloom)
- Make sure that perennials and trees have ample water.
- Chop leaves to use as mulch or to add to your compost.
- Cut grass shorter in November.
- Plant bulbs.
- Clean tools, sharpen spades, etc.
- Don't over-mulch around trees. 23" of mulch is ample. Avoid the volcano effect as it harbors mice and insects.
- An inexpensive way to mulch is to chop your leaves and place them in beds. It will amend the soil.
- Put a barrier round young trees to protect them from deer since it is rutting season. Tree guards are available for purchase. Where? You can also place bamboo stakes around tree and add fishing line.



Invasive Plants

We have all been horrified by the massive loss of trees on the West Coast since trees lessen the impact of climate change, help reduce pollution, and provide habitat for wildlife. Unfortunately, LG & E has had to remove some trees and vegetation in Windy Hills because of the federal power grid regulations (please refer to the Windy Hills website if you want more information). The company is working with homeowners and paying for replacement trees that are appropriate and meet Federal guidelines.

Regardless for the reason for planting replacement/new trees and shrubs, residents should avoid exotic, invasive plants. An "Exotic" plant or animal is one that is brought here from its place of origin. All exotics are not invasive. But the ones that are deemed invasive have no predators (disease, insects, birds) that keep them in check. They are so prolific that they may be the first to move in where there has been a fire or other disaster. Two perfect examples of exotics are Bush Honeysuckle, which is all over Windy Hills, and Kudzu which has finally reached Jefferson County. The former is spread by birds that eat the red berries and then eliminate them elsewhere. The only way to get rid of them is to cut them down and spray them with a strong herbicide immediately. The latter grows a foot a day.

Here is a list of a few that should NEVER be considered:

Tree of Heaven ,Mimosa, Amur Maple, Norway Maple, Autumn Olive, European Privet, White Mulberry, Amur Corktree, Common Buckthorn, Black Locust, Siberian Elm, Butterfly Bush,Burning Bush, Rose of Sharon, Bush Honeysuckle, Japanese Honeysuckle.

If you are planning to cut down trees or had trees that had to be removed by LG & E and you are limited to the size of replacements, here are some good native substitutes:

Redbud, Highbush Blueberry, Buttonbush, Winterberry, Spicebush, Scarlet Honeysuckle, Red or Yellow Osier Dogwood, and many Viburnum cultivars.


