This month I want to give a big shout-out to your Councilman, Steve Teaford, and to Councilwoman Julie Theiler! As you may know, Steve served as the Windy Hills Code Enforcement Officer before being elected as a Councilman last November. That experience provided him with tremendous knowledge about our City and its streets. Earlier this month, you may have seen B Sign Group replacing the Windy Hills street signs. The old ones were deteriorating rapidly, something Steve had noticed over the years. The new signs are made of aluminum and are lighter in weight, so they will be less likely to cause pole tilt. Work will continue over the next month until all our street signs have been replaced. The city will spend \$29,953 of our American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds on this project. The remaining ARPA funds have been committed to resurfacing the walking path on

the Green. Contracts with Hall Construction and Bluegrass Recreation were signed earlier this month, and construction should start in the coming months. You will also see in the coming weeks MAC construction trucks on the following streets: Deerfield Lane, Foeburn Way, Grassy Fork Court, Greenbriar Road, Old Farm Road, Kaelin Drive, Windsong Court, and Windsong Place. Our City's engineer deemed these streets to be most needed for repaving. The work, once begun, will span two or three weeks. Be prepared for the noise, dust, and temporary inconveniences. Councilman Teaford must be thanked for pushing this project through. Deerfield Lane had been on the list for repaving for several years but deferred because of its unique construction. We think (hope) that it is the only street in our city that began as a concrete surface, got covered with a road fabric, and finally surfaced with asphalt. The City will spend \$217,000 of our road fund on this year's paving projects.

Councilwoman Julie Thieler also needs recognition for two projects. First, what a wonderful 4th of July parade and picnic we had! We had great weather and a large turnout. The kids had fun, and the parade was, shall we say, comical! And the food, so much good food, was contributed by our residents. Councilwoman Theiler, and many other volunteers, put in a tremendous amount of time to make it happen. Compliments and thanks continue to come into City Hall. The second project that Councilwoman Theiler has taken on during this, her first year in office, is the monthly newsletter. The City Hall office regularly receives compliments regarding the newsletter's layout, content, and relevance. Particularly noted are the quarterly color issues. And people have enjoyed learning about other individuals and families who have chosen Windy Hills as their home. Councilwoman Theiler is truly committed to connecting people and building a sense of community.


All your City Council members are committed to serving you and to making life in Windy Hills the best it can be. Please thank them whenever you have the chance.

- Reduce your speed.

§ 72.13 PROHIBITED PARKING LOCATIONS.

(C) No person shall park any vehicle on any street for a period of time longer than ten minutes between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. of any day. Any person violating the provisions of § 72.13 shall be fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$100 per each offense. Each day's continued violation shall constitute a separate offense. In no event shall the minimum penalty for violation of § 72.13 be less than that provided by KRS or as provided by § 168 of the state constitution.

Lyndon Police Department - Auto Theft Prevention

One of the most infuriating things that can happen to a car owner is one of the most common forms of theft in the U.S., car break-ins. While there's no way to 100% deter these kinds of thieves, there are some common-sense steps you can take to make your vehicle a much less appealing target. Above all, thieves look for opportunities. Make them "work" for their pilfered prizes, and they'll most likely just forget it and move on to an easier target.

- Roll up windows and lock car doors.
- Activate the vehicle's alarm if it has one.
- Do not leave valuables in your car. If you must, place them in your trunk.
- If you can, park in your garage.
- Do not leave garage door openers visible in the vehicle. If you cannot park the vehicle in the garage, take the garage door opener inside.
- The vehicle title should be stored in a safe place inside your home. Only the registration papers and insurance card should be kept in the vehicle.
- Items such as a purse, gym bag, backpack, briefcase, or computer bag should not be left visible in the vehicle. These items should be placed in the trunk or out of sight before reaching your destination. Do not transfer or hide them at the parking place in view of others.
- Always park in a well-lighted area if possible.
- Never leave a vehicle running with the keys in the ignition.
- Write down vehicle information, including license plate information, VIN #, and identifiable markings on the vehicle (i.e., stickers or damage, etc.)
