The days are getting shorter, and the nights cooler. Leaves are beginning to change colors. Rabbits have fattened themselves in your summer garden and squirrels are burying acorns in your yard. Hummingbirds and butterflies are making their way south. Nature is getting ready for winter. Are you?

You may have heard that hospitalizations due to COVID infections are on the rise again. In addition, cases of Influenza (Flu) and Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) have already been reported in our area. While these respiratory infections are not fatal in most cases, they do account for tens of thousands of deaths in the United States each year. And, even if the infection is not fatal, these infections can severely damage your lungs. Many who get infected are left with asthma, recurrent bronchitis, and difficulty breathing.

These breathing problems can also affect your heart, especially if you already have a heart condition. The young, the old, people with cancer or diabetes, and individuals with other heart, lung, liver, and kidney diseases are most at risk – but everyone is vulnerable.

I would not be a responsible Mayor and certainly not a good doctor if I failed to encourage you to get your Flu and COVID vaccinations now, in preparation for winter. This past week the FDA approved the COVID vaccine that will help protect against the more recent variants. If you have not had COVID in the past four months, nor a COVID booster in the past 4 months, the CDC is recommending that you get this new booster. Also, this year's Flu vaccine protects against the types of influenza viruses that have already infected other parts of the world and are moving our way. Between now and the end of October is the best time to get the Covid and Flu vaccines to get the best protection over the winter. You can get these vaccinations at the same time – I would recommend one shot in each arm.

In addition, this year there is a new vaccine out for adults 60 or older. It is a vaccine against the Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV). Syncytial means a mass of damaged cells clumped together. This is what happens to the delicate airway tissue, deep in your lungs when infected by this virus. This virus causes bronchiolitis in infants and young children. But we know that it can also cause serious problems in, shall we say, our more mature residents. If you are 60 years or older, please consult with your doctor to see if this vaccine is right for you.

So, as you prepare for winter. Be wise – be vaccinated! As always, thank you for allowing me to be your Mayor. And, thank you for being informed and involved residents!

Meet Your Neighbors




Holly Collins

Former Windy Hills Mayor Lou Phillips passed away on August 28, 2023. Lou was Mayor of Windy Hills for 12 years and a Council member before and after he served as Mayor. So many firsts started during his terms of office: sidewalks encircling Windy Hills; benches and trash receptacles along the sidewalk for walkers; the land for the Green was purchased; holiday lights were strung on the spruce on the Green; and Glow on the Green was celebrated.

His most notable legacy was the creation of a sense of "community". He led the efforts to brand our City as "Windy Hills, City of Historic Homes", erected signature entrances, and created a Tree Board, our City became an official Tree

Lou took his job seriously. He was at the office daily. Lou was a "hands-on" mayor and was present at anything involving the city—from social events to highway meetings. Fifteen years ago, when residents said they lived in Windy Hills, it involved giving geographic parameters. Rumpke - Making Recycling Easier



The average American generates nearly one ton of trash a year, creating serious problems if it all goes into the landfill.

Identifying recyclables and committing to household recycling practices goes a long way in reducing waste. When recyclable items are thrown away with other solid waste, they take up valuable space at landfills. However, when recyclable items are placed in recycling bins they are sent to a Material Recovery Facility (MRF) where they are separated and transported to end markets to be turned into something new. Recycling certain materials offers benefits to

the environment by conserving natural resources, reducing pollution, and saving energy. Rumpke's single-stream recycling program allows residential recyclables to be mixed together and sorted later at our state-of-the-art recycling facilities.

Single-stream programs focus on all recyclable materials generated by residents-glass recycling, plastic recycling, and more—not just individual presorted materials. This comprehensive approach helps divert the greatest volume of recyclable materials from landfills.

Residents can typically recycle the following items:

• Plastic bottles, jugs, and tubs

- Glass bottles and jars
- Aluminum cans
- Paperboard (like cereal boxes)
- Steel cans and lids
- Cardboard
- Office paper
- Envelopes and junk mail
- Newspapers, magazines, and inserts
- Telephone books and catalogs
- Cartons

On collection day, your recycling will go through our system and be reliably sorted by material type You'll be doing your part to help protect the environment while we make residential waste disposal easier for you

PLEASE REMEMBER

Trash/recycling must be placed curbside the night before your scheduled collection. Drivers will not return to residences if materials are unprepared at the scheduled collection time. Please contact Rumpke at least 48 hours before your regularly scheduled collection to request a large item pickup for acceptable large items, and/or excessive amounts of trash.

2023 Property Taxes - What You Need to Know

- The Ordinance allowing taxation (Ord No 2 2022-2023 for Fiscal Year 2023-2024) can be found in the June Newsletter or on the Windy Hills Website under the Code Enforcement tab in the Budget Ordinances and Property Tax Ordinances section. Please read the Ordinance carefully for additional information.
- Important!!! If payment is received or postmarked by October 31, 2023, a 43% discount will be provided. Penalties and interest take effect if payment is not made by December 31st. The interest is compounded monthly, not annually, and a lien will be placed on your property until the tax, interest, and penalties are paid.
- Learn from the Mayor's personal experience!!! If you have a mortgage and an escrow account, your mortgage company should pay your property tax bill. However, the mortgage company may view December 31st as the due date. Please encourage the mortgage company to pay by October 31. It will save you a lot of money. While it is the homeowner's responsibility to ensure the bill has been paid, please communicate with your mortgage company to avoid sending in a duplicate payment.
- Fifty-six percent of our City's general revenue comes from property taxes, and 70% goes to sanitation and public safety services. The Budget (Ord No 3 2022-2023 for Fiscal Year 2023-2024) can be found in the June Newsletter or on the Windy Hills Website under the Code Enforcement tab in the Budget Ordinances and Property Tax Ordinances section.
