Second, we hear a lot from METRO about the need to plant more trees. Well I am happy to report on a number of accomplishments in this area achieved in Windy Hills.

- Over 300 trees have been planted since 2007 through the efforts of residents taking advantage of the City's incentives for adding trees to their homes and plantings on The Green and other public areas.
- In 2013 Windy Hills met the requirements of the Arbor Day Foundation and was awarded the Tree City USA designation.
- The City planted trees along Ambridge Drive, a main City thoroughfare.
- A Tree Board was established to promote planting and maintaining Windy Hills trees.

Finally, the property tax bills will be mailed around the end of September. Please remember residents will be able to take advantage of a 40% discount rate this year (an increase from 30% last year) if property taxes are paid before November 1st.

We are proud of our efforts to improve the quality of life within our community and thank all our residents for making Windy Hills the BEST small city of the over 80 suburban cities in METRO.

Street Repaying For 2015



This work was approved at our August 10, 2015 City Council Meeting. When the work is scheduled the residents will be notified in order to minimize the disruption.



We hope you realize our streets and roads are in much better condition than those in Louisville Metro.

Don't Top Your Trees

Tree topping is the practice of removing whole tops of trees and branches, leaving unsightly stubs or lateral



branches that are not large enough to assume the role of a central leader. Topping may result from the electric company

butchering the tree because it is interfering with the wires. This is a reason homeowners should do their homework in picking the "right tree for the right place." A homeowner may decide that the tree is too large. Or perhaps his/her garden laborer thinks topping will benefit the tree because there will be a flush of new growth. Or perhaps a disreputable "tree expert", driving through the neighborhood, convinces the homeowner that the tree is a hazard and needs to be shortened. DO NOT TOP THE TREE! It will only cause problems.

- 1. It will be disfigured for life, thus reducing the property value.
- 2. Its ability to produce food will be reduced.
- 3. The reduced amount of shade will mean less protection for the bark.
- 4. The large stubs will have a difficult time healing and will encourage insect infestation and disease.
- 5. The newly growing branches will be weak and will be dangerous.
- 6. The idea of topping it to control the size will actually backfire. There will be a flourish of new growth that will be in the form of water sprouts that will increase the size of the tree in a few years.

There are times when the size and shape of a shade tree need to be controlled. Responsible pruning by an informed homeowner or a certified arborist can keep a tree healthy and safe. Ideally, this should begin in the early life of the tree and should be done on a regular basis (every 2-3 years). Arborists are not cheap. It costs more to prune than to top a tree. Most arborists will refuse to top a tree even if the property owner insists. But in the long run, the topped tree will most likely need to be removed after a few years at a much greater expense.

Snow Removal From City Streets

The Goal of our snow removal service is to keep our streets passable and as safe as possible in view of the circumstances. We salt the hills and intersections in the City and plow when necessary to keep the streets open. Caution, however, should always be used. We do not work on Rudy Lane or Brownsboro Rd. because they are not City Streets.

In view of the size of the City, all streets can't be treated at the same time; however we do pre-treat when possible in anticipation of a storm. It's the same with plowing in that all streets can't be plowed at the same time, and we recognize everybody would like to be first. Depending on the circumstances, all streets may not be plowed. The key is that a flat street is usually passable with caution, even if not down to the blacktop. Again, the amount of traffic and the sun also affect the road surface.

It should also be noted that we don't wait for all of the snow to be on the ground before starting to work as we expect our contractor to work throughout the night as necessary.

A side effect of plowing is that the snow is pushed to the right and often blocks driveways. This can't be helped and it falls on the homeowner to clear the access to the street.

We hope to have a light year for snow and ice but we do hope this explains our process for keeping our streets open.






















Windy Hills Bulletin Board

Dog Waste Problems


